The Waterville Board of Education is composed of seven members who are elected by district residents to serve three-year terms. Members volunteer their time and receive no compensation. Collectively, the Board of Education has legal responsibility for the operation of the entire district. The Board establishes the policies under which the school district operates, and the Superintendent of Schools is responsible for administering the school program within the context of these policies. The Board's powers and duties are derived from the State Constitution, the laws of New York State, and rulings of the State Commissioner of Education. The Board's four main areas of responsibility are to:

- Establish all school district policies.
- Develop an annual budget for public approval.
- Approve or disapprove the Superintendent's recommendations regarding personnel matters and the many contracts the district must enter into.
- Act as a two-way communications link between residents and the Superintendent.

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act & Directory Information

The District complies with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974. Parents and 18-year-old students may inspect official records relating to them including progress reports, grades, aptitude and achievement test scores, psychological tests, and teacher evaluations. A record may be challenged by parents or 18-year-olds when they believe it to be inaccurate or misleading. All requests to inspect and review a student's record must be submitted to the District's Records Access Officer. The District designates the following information as Directory Information: student's name, parent's name, address, date and place of birth, telephone number, email address, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees, and awards received, most recent previous educational agency attended by student, photograph, and video images of students engaged in routine activities when those images are not records of the district's law enforcement unit. As required by federal law, the District discloses the names, addresses and telephone numbers of juniors and seniors to military recruiters. Parental permission is assumed unless the Waterville Central School District is notified in writing. Please refer to Policy 7500 for more information or contact the superintendent.

APPR Disclosure

In compliance with New York State law, parents who are interested in reviewing the Annual Professional Performance Review (APPR) of their child's classroom teacher or principal may request the final quality rating and composite effectiveness score directly from either the school (for teachers) or superintendent (for principals).

Asbestos Notification

In accordance with the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act of 1987 (AHERA), a copy of the Waterville Central School District buildings inspection report and management plan is available for review during business hours by appointment. For more information, please contact the school business executive at 315.841.3913. In compliance with AHERA, the district conducts the following:

- Reinspects all buildings and spaces every three years for all asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM). There were no triennial inspections completed this year.
- Conducts a visual surveillance of all known and assumed ACBM in each building once every six months.
- Samples previously untested building materials suspected of containing asbestos as needed.
- Updates the asbestos management plan

Pesticide Notification

Waterville Central School District uses current Integrated Pest Management practices to reduce the use of pesticides in its buildings and on its grounds. While it is not part of our usual practice, it may be necessary to use pesticides during the year. If you would like to be notified 48 hours prior to a regulated pesticide application, please contact the superintendent's office at 315.841.3816. Some pesticide applications are not subject to notification requirements, including

anti-microbial products, EPA-designated biopesticides and exempt materials, and when a school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72 hours following an application. If you have any questions, please contact the district's Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Coordinator, Tom Gleason, 315.841.3830.

Non-Discrimination Notice

The Waterville Central School District does not discriminate on the basis of sex, race, color, national origin, handicap, or age in employment or in providing student access to educational programs, courses and activities. This policy is in compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the Age Discrimination Act of 1975. Military Recruiters and Institutes of Higher Education Access to High School Student Information

Pursuant to federal law, the district must provide to military recruiters and institutions of higher education, upon request, the names, addresses and telephone numbers of high school students. Parents/guardians or students ages 18 or older who do not want this information released to military recruiters and/or institutes of higher education should contact the Jr./Sr. High School Principal.

Student Discipline

The Waterville Central School District is committed to providing a safe and orderly school environment where students may receive and district personnel may deliver quality educational services without disruption or interference. Responsible behavior by students, teachers, other district personnel, parents and other visitors is essential to achieving this goal.

The Board recognizes the need to clearly define these expectations for acceptable conduct on school property, identify the possible consequences of unacceptable conduct, and to ensure that discipline, when necessary, is administered fairly and promptly. To this end, the district follows a student Code of Conduct (Policy 1005). This Code of Conduct is posted on the Waterville Central School District website at www.watervillecsd.org under quick links. Additionally, a plain language summary is included in the building handbooks.

Internet-Enabled Devices in Schools

The Waterville Central School District acknowledges the value of technology in education but also recognizes that mobile devices can interfere with student focus and disrupt the learning environment. To support a distraction-free school day, Policy 5304 prohibits the use or display of mobile devices—including cell phones, smart watches, and wireless earbuds—from the start to the end of the regular school day.

All students in pre-K through grade 12 must keep devices turned off and stored in their lockers. This rule applies throughout the school building, including hallways, restrooms, lunch periods, and during transitions.



Exceptions are available for medical reasons with documentation from a licensed provider and approval from the District Medical Director. Students needing to make a call during the day must use school phones in the main or counseling office.

Dignity for All Students Act

In accordance with the Dignity for All Students Act, Education Law, Article 2, the District will strive to create an environment free of discrimination and harassment and will foster civility in the schools to prevent and prohibit conduct which is inconsistent with the District's educational mission. All forms of discrimination and harassment of students and staff based on actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender, or sex by school employees or students on school property and at school-sponsored activities and events that take place at locations off school property is hereby strictly prohibited. Rules against discrimination and harassment are included in the Code of Conduct (Policy 1005), publicized and disseminated to all staff and parents.

If you believe you, or someone else, has been the target of harassment, bullying, cyberbullying, and/or discrimination, please complete the DASA form (Regulation 0015.2) to report an allegation and contact your building's Dignity Act Coordinator who is also the building principal. Attendance

The Waterville Central School District Board of Education, in partnership with district leadership and staff, recognizes that regular school attendance is essential to student success. A strong connection exists between time spent actively engaged in learning and academic performance, life opportunities, and social-emotional well-being.

In compliance with New York State law, the Board

has adopted a Comprehensive Attendance Policy (Policy 7020). This policy requires all students between the ages of 6 and 17 (Policy 7001) to attend school full time, unless they have completed a four-year high school course of study. The policy is designed to promote student attendance and outlines procedures for addressing absences, tardiness, and early departures.

Excused absences include personal illness, serious illness or death in the family, impassable roads or hazardous weather conditions, religious observances, quarantine, court appearances, medical or state agency appointments that cannot be scheduled outside school hours, approved college visits, cooperative work programs, military obligations, detention or incarceration, and any other reason deemed valid by the Commissioner or Building Principal.

Unexcused absences, even with parental permission, include but are not limited to vacations, shopping trips, babysitting, oversleeping, missing the bus, cold weather, hunting or fishing, personal errands, off-campus lunch, beauty or grooming appointments, driver's tests, job interviews, and events such as Senior Skip Day (not recognized by the District). Absences without parent/guardian knowledge or consent are considered truancy.

Parents/guardians are required to notify the school whenever a student is tardy, leaves early, or is absent for any part of the school day. Students may attend non-public schools or receive home instruction, provided all requirements set forth by the New York State Education Department are met. Regardless of the setting, families are responsible for ensuring that students attend regularly and that absences are reported promptly.

It is important for families to understand that missing just two days a month—18 days over the course of the year—qualifies a student

as chronically absent, which can significantly hinder academic progress and development. In cases of chronic absenteeism, the District may initiate interventions and, when necessary, refer the matter to the Oneida County Probation Department or Child Protective Services.

The District's Safety Plan and Emergency Response Procedures

The Waterville Central School District has a District School Safety Plan and confidential Building-Level Emergency Response Plans for each building as required by New York State Safe School Against Violence in Education (S.A.V.E.) Law. This law requires the district to annually update the plans, seek public comment and provide information to all students and staff about emergency procedures. The District's Safety Plan and Building-Level Emergency Response Plans are reviewed annually by district committees. All updates are approved by the Board of Education prior to submitting the plans to the New York State Education Department and the New York State Police. The district conducts periodic safety audits with police, fire officials, EMT/ ambulance, and with the BOCES Safety Office.

The district provides training throughout the year and, at a minimum, conducts at least eight fire drills, four lockdown drills, and a district- wide drill to test other emergency plans and/or early dismissal. New York State Education Law requires school districts to notify parents and guardians within one week of when a safety drill is being conducted. Emergency school closings or delays will be communicated through ParentSquare and posted on the district's website. Our schools regularly practice the following safety drills, throughout the year.

- Evacuate moving students from a school building to a predetermined safe location.
- Shelter/Shelter-in-Place keeping students in the building when it is safer to stay inside.
- Lockdown clearing hallways, securing rooms, and remaining hidden and silent

- in response to an immediate threat of violence. Lockdowns end only when law enforcement physically releases those inside.
- Hold/Hold-in-Place restricting movement within the building during a short-term emergency.
- Secure Lockout locking and securing the building when a threat exists outside the school.

Parents' Bill of Rights for Data Protection and Privacy

The Waterville School District seeks to use current technology, including electronic storage, retrieval, and analysis of information about students' education experience in the district, to enhance the opportunities for learning and to increase the efficiency of our district and school operations. The District seeks to ensure that parents have information about how the District stores, retrieves, and uses information about students, and to meet all legal requirements for maintaining the privacy and security of protected student data and protected principal and teacher data, including Section 2-d of the New York State Education Law. Student Privacy

The Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment provides parents/guardians with certain rights regarding the conduct of surveys, collection and use of information for marketing purposes and certain physical exams. In particular, if a survey is funded in whole or part by the U.S. Department of Education, parents/guardians have the right to consent before students are required to complete a survey that asks about

any of the following protected areas:

- Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parents/guardians;
- Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family;
- Sexual behavior or attitudes;
- Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating or demeaning behavior;
- Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships;
- Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors or ministers;
- Religious practices, affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parent/guardian; or
- Income, other than as required by law to determine program eligibility.

Parents/guardians will also receive a notice and an opportunity to opt students out of the following:

- Any other survey that asks about the above protected areas;
- Any non-emergency, invasive physical exam or screening required as a condition of attending school or school functions, with the exception of physical exams or screenings required or permitted by state law (e.g. hearing, vision or scoliosis); and
- Activities involving collection, disclosure or use of personal information collected from students for marketing or to sell or otherwise distribute the information to others.

Parents/guardians have the right to inspect any surveys that ask about the above protected areas, as well as surveys created by third parties that are used to collect personal information from students for marketing purposes and instructional materials used as part of the curriculum.

The school district will directly notify parents/ guardians of its student privacy policy at the start of each school year and after any substantive changes. Parents/guardians will also be provided with reasonable notification of specific activities or surveys covered by this policy and the ability to opt their child out of such activities.

These rights transfer from the parents/guardians to their child who is at least 18 years old or an emancipated minor.

Anyone who believes their rights have been violated may file a complaint with: Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Department of Education, 400 Maryland Avenue, SW, Washington, D.C. 20202.

Child Find Notice

If your child is disabled or you suspect he/she may be disabled, he or she may be entitled to special education and/or related services without cost to you. A child with a disability is entitled to a Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE). If you have questions or wish to refer your child for an evaluation, please contact Ms. Katie Hansen, Director of Special Programs at 315.841.3750.

Physicals, Immunizations & Medicines

New York State Education law requires that each new entrant to the district and students who are in grades pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11, have a physical examination to be completed by your own health care provider or the school physician/nurse practitioner. A vision, hearing, growth and scoliosis screening will be performed by the school nurse and school nurse practitioner for the required grades. A dental examination/certificate is also requested for all new students as well as students in grades pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11.

 Pre-K and kindergarten students are required to see their own health care provider and submit a completed physical and updated booster immunization records prior to the first day of school. Blood lead testing is required for pre-K students within three months of enrollment.

- A current physical exam is required for all interscholastic sports. Sports physicals can be done by your personal health care provider prior to the beginning of the sports season.
- In compliance with New York State law, for students to receive medication (prescription or non-prescription including cough drops and other "over-the-counter" drugs) during the school day, the following procedures must be followed and renewed each year:
 - The parent/guardian must submit a written request to the principal/school nurse from the prescribing physician/ health care provider indicating the frequency and dosage.
 - The medication must be brought to the school by a responsible adult in the original container labeled with the name of the medicine and dosage.
 - Medication cannot be brought to and from school. Only supply what is needed during the hours of school and keep the rest at home.
 - > Students cannot transport the medicine on themselves.

Transportation

Students who are residents of the Waterville School District are eligible for transportation in accordance with Policy 5400. All students must behave appropriately as passengers on the school bus. Although the schools have established procedures and rules for the safe and orderly conduct of students on buses, it is important for parents to impress upon their children the absolute necessity for exhibiting safe behavior. Students who violate the District's rules for orderly conduct on buses,

and thereby threaten the safety of all, may have their transportation privileges suspended or revoked as riding the bus is a privilege, not a right. (See Policy 5403.)

Deadline for Nonpublic School Transportation Request

New York State Education law and school district policy requires districts to provide transportation for resident students who attend nonpublic schools if the school they wish to attend is not more than 15 miles from their home, and only if a formal written request to the superintendent is submitted by a parent/guardian by April 1 for each upcoming school year.



Promotion and Placement

The Waterville Central School District is sensitive to concerns regarding the criteria used for making student grade promotion and placement decisions. In light of these concerns, and in compliance with relevant provisions of the Education Law and Regulations of the Commissioner of Education, the district has adopted Policy 8100, Promotion and Retention of Students and Policy 8101 Grading System. Breakfast and Lunch

All Pre-K-12 students can eat breakfast and a hot lunch daily at no cost to families. Families are still asked to complete an income form through ezmealapp.com to ensure eligibility for district grant awards are not impacted. While a variety of food choices are made available to all students, parents and guardians may also request meal modifications if the available options do not meet their child's dietary needs. To request a meal modification, please contact your student's school.

Body Mass Index

New York State requires schools to track each student's body mass index (BMI) and weight status category as part of school health examinations. Every year, the New York State Department of Health surveys some schools for the number of students in each weight status category. If the Waterville Central School District is surveyed by the state, the district will share summary group data only and will not share summary group calculations. In order to opt out of the sharing of this data, parents/guardians must contact the school nurse.

Concussion

New York state requires tackle football programs to provide information about concussions and sub-concussive blows, and the injuries that might occur as a result of such blows, to the parents/guardians of all children participating in tackle football programs. The

Waterville Central School District is providing the following materials at the athletic director's office and on the district website so that you are aware of the risks of concussion and other brain injuries.

Child Abuse Hotline

If you suspect a child is being abused or maltreated (neglected), report it by calling 1.800.342.3720, a toll-free 24-hour hotline operated by the New York State Office of Children and Family Services. If you believe a child is in immediate danger, call 911 or your local police department. Information about reporting child abuse and maltreatment (neglect) is available online at http://ocfs.ny.gov/programs/cps/.

Hand Sanitizer

The district will be making alcohol-based hand sanitizers available in its school buildings. If parents/guardians wish to opt their child out of using it, they should send a written notice to the school building principal.

Sudden Cardiac Arrest Prevention

The Dominic Murray Sudden Cardiac Arrest Prevention Act is to promote safe interscholastic athletics participation and to prevent incidents of Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) in student athletes. The law requires districts to provide information to parents/guardians of student athletes prior to the student's participation in any interscholastic athletics. The law also requires teachers who coach extra-class athletic activity and coaches to hold a valid certificate of completion of a first aid knowledge and skills course offered by a nationally recognized organization. Health Information Privacy

Patient health care records maintained by schools are considered education records and are thus subject to the Family Educational

Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) rules, and not the privacy portions of HIPAA. When a school wants or needs health information from outside health care providers, schools will need to adhere to the disclosure requirements of the outside health care providers (which are HIPAA-governed) in order to gain access to the information.

Participation in Graduation Ceremonies by All Eligible Students

New York State Education Law requires the Waterville Central School District to inform students and parents/guardians of the district's policy that all eligible students are allowed to participate in a high school graduation ceremony and associated graduation activities with their graduating class (i.e., the 12th-grade class with which such student entered into ninth grade). This includes students who have been awarded a Skills and Achievement Commencement Credential or Career Development and Occupational Studies Commencement Credential.

New York State Report Cards

As required by New York State Education Law, the district is sharing its school-level and district report cards with parents/guardians. This information can be accessed via the district website or by contacting the superintendent's office.

Non-Discrimination Policy / Equal Opportunity Policy

The district does not discriminate on the basis of race (defined as, but not limited to, ancestry, color, ethnic group identification, and ethnic background, as well as traits historically associated with race including hair texture and protective hairstyles), color, national origin, creed, disability, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, age, military status or any other protected status in its educational programs, employment or any other activities. Further, it is unlawful for an employer to retaliate against any individual because that person filed a

complaint, opposed any unlawful practice or testified or assisted in an investigation or proceeding. Any inquiries and complaints regarding non-discrimination in the district may be referred to the district's Compliance Officer, Cynthia Amarosa.

Transportation to Non-Public Schools

If your child attends a non-public school within the Waterville area and needs transportation to their school, please contact Ethan Ostrander, Transportation Supervisor, at 315.841.3786 to determine if the district can provide transportation. Transportation requests for the upcoming school year should be made by April 1 each year.
